REPORTING PRACTICE SUMMARY – 2024

Bosnia and Herzegovina continued to provide **Numbers** and **Values** for major conventional arms and SALW exports, as well as **Numbers** and **Values** for SALW imports.

It did not specify whether these transfers were **Authorized** or **Actual**.

GOOD PRACTICES

Bosnia and Herzegovina provided numbers, values, and trading partners for all reported transfers.

In most cases, Bosnia and Herzegovina clearly indicated that there were no reported transfers in specific sub-categories of arms by inserting a '/' in the relevant fields.

Bosnia and Herzegovina provided descriptions for most of its transfers.

ROOM FOR IMPROVEMENT

Bosnia and Herzegovina did not specify whether it reported authorized or actual transfers.

Bosnia and Herzegovina did not complete all boxes of the front-page box 'Contents of report' of the ATT reporting template.

TRANSFER SUMMARY – 2024: EXPORT DATA

- Bosnia and Herzegovina reported exports to 11 countries. Of these, seven were ATT States Parties, two were Signatories and two were non-States Parties (Indonesia and Iraq).
- Bosnia and Herzegovina reported the export of 271,493 major conventional arms, all of them being large-calibre artillery systems with a total value of €259m (US\$280m).
- In terms of numbers, the main importers of major conventional arms from Bosnia and Herzegovina were the United States (88.7 per cent), the Czech Republic (11.2 per cent) and Indonesia (0.1 per cent). In terms of value, the main importers were the United States (93.1 per cent), the Czech Republic (3.5 per cent) and Mongolia (1.5 per cent).

- Bosnia and Herzegovina reported the export of 7,576 small arms and light weapons valued at €3.38m (US\$3.65m), covering five sub-categories. In terms of numbers, the majority were revolvers and self-loading pistols (79.3 per cent), light machine guns (13.2 per cent) and rifles and carbines (4.2 per cent). In terms of value, most exports were revolvers and self-loading pistols (50.4 per cent), light machine guns (19.2 per cent) and mortars of calibres less than 75mm (12.6 per cent).
- In terms of numbers, the main importers of small arms and light weapons were the United States (66.0 per cent), Iraq (13.2 per cent) and Serbia (13.2 per cent). In terms of value, the main importers were the United States (36.9 per cent), Mongolia (24.6 per cent) and Iraq (19.2 per cent).

TRANSFER SUMMARY – 2024: IMPORT DATA

- Bosnia and Herzegovina reported imports from 12 countries. Of these, ten were ATT States Parties and two were Signatories.
- Bosnia and Herzegovina did not report the import of any major conventional arms.
- Bosnia and Herzegovina reported the import of 9,983 small arms and light weapons valued at €5.53m (US\$5.99m), covering four sub-categories. In terms of numbers, the majority were revolvers and self-loading pistols (92.0 per cent), rifles and carbines (7.8 per cent) and sub-machine guns (0.2 per cent). In terms of value, the majority were revolvers and self-loading pistols (81.2 per cent), rifles and carbines (15.7 per cent) and sub-machine guns (3.1 per cent).
- In terms of numbers, the main exporters of small arms and light weapons to Bosnia and Herzegovina were the Czech Republic (41.1 per cent), Türkiye (28.4 per cent) and the United States (15.1 per cent). In terms of value, the main exporters were the Czech Republic (61.9 per cent), the United States (12.2 per cent) and Türkiye (11.7 per cent).
