REPORTING PRACTICE SUMMARY – 2024

Canada continued to report **Actual Numbers** of major conventional arms and small arms and light weapons exports.

GOOD PRACTICES

Canada disaggregated all reported transfers by weapon category, sub-category and trading partner.

Canada provided comments for all its reported transfers, as well as descriptions for some of its exports of major conventional arms.

ROOM FOR IMPROVEMENT

Canada could provide descriptions for all transfers of major conventional arms and small arms and light weapons.

TRANSFER SUMMARY – 2024: EXPORT DATA

- Canada reported exports to 13 countries. Of these, eight were ATT States Parties, four were Signatories and one was a non-State Party (Saudi Arabia).
- Canada reported the export of 452 major conventional arms. These were armoured combat vehicles (99.1 per cent), battle tanks (0.7 per cent) and manned combat aircraft (0.2 per cent).
- The main importers of major conventional arms from Canada were Ukraine (77.4 per cent), Saudi Arabia (13.9 per cent) and the United States (2.4 per cent).
- Canada reported the export of 8,056 small arms and light weapons covering four sub-categories. The vast majority were assault rifles (93.4 per cent), light machine guns (4.5 per cent) and rifles and carbines (1.6 per cent).
- The main importers of small arms and light weapons from Canada were Ukraine (45.5 per cent), the Netherlands (44.6 per cent) and Denmark (9.0 per cent).

TRANSFER SUMMARY – 2024: IMPORT DATA

- Canada reported imports from ten countries. Of these, eight were ATT States Parties and two were Signatories.
- Canada did not report any imports of major conventional arms.
- Canada reported the import of 282 units of small arms and light weapons covering six sub-categories. The majority were revolvers and self-loading pistols (81.9 per cent), hand-held under-barrel and mounted grenade launchers (7.4 per cent) and rifles and carbines (6.0 per cent).
- The main exporters of small arms and light weapons to Canada were the United States (49.6 per cent), Austria (34.0 per cent) and the Czech Republic (5.3 per cent).
