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REPORTING PRACTICE SUMMARY - 2022

Australia continued to report **Authorized Numbers** and **Values** of most of its major conventional weapons and SALW exports.

Australia continued to report **Actual Numbers** of major conventional weapons and SALW imports.

Australia continued to provide aggregated information on SALW imports.

**GOOD PRACTICES**

Australia specified in some places where information was withheld for 'commercial sensitivity/national security related' reasons.

Australia provided descriptions and comments for all of its major conventional exports and imports.

Australia indicated that there were no reported exports in some weapons categories and sub-categories.

**ROOM FOR IMPROVEMENT**

Australia continued to provide aggregated numbers and values of exports and imports of SALW, making it impossible to determine weapons sub-categories and final destinations of the transfers.

Australia could provide information on final exporting states for its reported imports.

Australia could provide more descriptions and comments on the nature of exports and imports of SALW.

**TRANSFER SUMMARY - 2022: EXPORT DATA**

- Australia reported exports to 23 countries and territories.¹ Of these, 14 were ATT States Parties, three were Signatories and four were non-members (Indonesia, Pakistan, Papua New Guinea and Solomon Islands).
- Australia reported the export of 446 major conventional weapons covering three categories with a total value of AU\$119.3m (US\$82.7m).² In terms of value, these were armoured combat vehicles (99.9 per cent) and large-caliber artillery systems (0.1 per cent).
- In terms of value, the main importers of major conventional weapons from Australia were Ukraine (71.9 per cent), Indonesia (25.1 per cent) and Japan (2.7 per cent).
- Australia reported the export of 5,095 small arms with a total value of AU\$10.4m (US\$7.2m).³
- In terms of value, the main importers of small arms from Australia were Ukraine (64.4 per cent), United States (22.2 per cent) and New Zealand (4.9 per cent).

**TRANSFER SUMMARY - 2022: IMPORT DATA**

- Australia reported imports from one Signatory.
- Australia reported the import of 281 major conventional weapons items, covering five categories. In terms of numbers, these were armoured combat vehicles (68.3 per cent), battle tanks (26.7 per cent) and manned combat aircraft (5 per cent).
- In terms of numbers, the final exporting state reported was the United States (0.1 per cent). Australia did not report the final exporting state for 99.9 per cent of its reported imports.
- Australia reported the import of 2,683 SALW items, covering three sub-categories.⁴ These were revolvers and self-loading pistols (95.3 per cent), rifles and carbines (3 per cent) and portable anti-tank guns (1.8 per cent).
- Australia reported 117,319 weapons imports under voluntary national categories. These were rifles (56.5 per cent), shotguns (26 per cent) and handguns (13.7 per cent).
