REPORTING PRACTICE SUMMARY - 2022

Czech Republic's reporting changed in 2022.

**GOOD PRACTICES**

Czech Republic provided disaggregated numbers for all its exports and imports, both by weapon type and by importing and exporting state.

Czech Republic clarified descriptions of the reported imports/exports under the small arms and light weapons 'others' category.

**ROOM FOR IMPROVEMENT**

Czech Republic could provide more comments and descriptions on the nature of all its exports and imports of SALW and major conventional weapons.

Czech Republic could indicate clearly that there were no reported exports or imports in specific weapons categories and sub-categories rather than leaving relevant sections of the reporting template blank.

**TRANSFER SUMMARY - 2022: EXPORT DATA**

- Czech Republic reported exports to 48 countries in 2022. Of these, 31 were ATT States Parties, nine were Signatories and eight were non-members (India, Indonesia, Iraq, Jordan, Kenya, Morocco, Pakistan and Sri Lanka).
- It reported the export of 629 major conventional weapons, covering four categories. The majority of these were unmanned combat aircraft (51.4 per cent), large-caliber artillery systems (18.6 per cent) and armoured combat vehicles (17 per cent).
- The main importers of major conventional weapons from Czech Republic were Ukraine (84.6 per cent), Morocco (5.2 per cent) and Netherlands (4.1 per cent).
- Czech Republic reported the export of 56,091 SALW items covering ten sub-categories. Of these, the majority were revolvers and self-loading pistols (41.5 per cent), portable anti-tank guns (36.8 per cent) and assault rifles (8.6 per cent).
- The main importers of SALW from Czech Republic were Ukraine (21 per cent), Slovakia (18.1 per cent) and United States (8.7 per cent).

**TRANSFER SUMMARY - 2022: IMPORT DATA**

- Czech Republic reported imports from ten countries in 2022. Of these, five were ATT States Parties, three were Signatories, and two were non-members (Ethiopia and Jordan).
- Czech Republic reported the import of 51 major conventional weapons items, covering two categories. These were large-caliber artillery systems (98 per cent) and unmanned combat aircraft (2 per cent).
- The exporters of major conventional weapons to Czech Republic were Jordan (98 per cent) and Norway (2 per cent).
- Czech Republic reported the import of 3,774 SALW items covering eight sub-categories. Of these, the majority were rifles and carbines (57.1 per cent), light machine guns (14.5 per cent) and assault rifles (12.2 per cent).
- The main exporters of SALW to Czech Republic were Ethiopia (48.2 per cent), Montenegro (29.9 per cent) and Bosnia and Herzegovina (7.9 per cent).
