REPORTING PRACTICE SUMMARY - 2022

Germany continued to report **Actual Numbers** of major conventional weapons exports and **Authorized Numbers** of SALW exports.

Germany continued to report **Actual Numbers** of major conventional weapons imports and it continued to report **Authorized Numbers** of SALW imports.

**GOOD PRACTICES**

Germany provided clear, disaggregated data for each reported export and import.

Germany provided comments describing the nature of most of its SALW imports.

Germany provided descriptions of all its major conventional weapons exports and imports.

Germany provided descriptions of imports reported in the small arms 'others' sub-categories.

Germany reported the state of origin of some of its reported exports and imports.

**ROOM FOR IMPROVEMENT**

Germany could provide descriptions and comments describing the nature of all reported exports and imports.

Germany could indicate clearly that there were no reported exports or imports in specific weapons categories and sub-categories rather than leaving relevant sections of the reporting template blank.

**TRANSFER SUMMARY - 2022: EXPORT DATA**

- Germany reported exports to 30 countries in 2022. Of these, 25 were ATT States Parties, two were Signatories and three were non-members (Egypt, Jordan and Pakistan).
- Germany reported the export of 539 major conventional weapons, covering six categories. The majority of these were missile and missile launchers (missiles, etc.) (71.6 per cent), armoured combat vehicles (23.9 per cent) and large-caliber artillery systems (3.7 per cent).
- The main importers of major conventional weapons from Germany were Ukraine (73.7 per cent), United States (16.9 per cent) and Lithuania (5.4 per cent).
- Germany reported the exports of 89,287 SALW, covering eight sub-categories. The majority were assault rifles (48.3 per cent), recoilless rifles (42.6 per cent) and 'others' (small arms) (3.6 per cent).
- The main importers of SALW from Germany were Ukraine (41.9 per cent), France (17.1 per cent) and Lithuania (12.3 per cent).

**TRANSFER SUMMARY - 2022: IMPORT DATA**

- Germany reported imports from 29 countries in 2022. Of these, 25 were ATT States Parties and four were Signatories.
- Germany reported the import of five major conventional weapons items, covering two categories. These were missile and missile launchers (missiles, etc.) (60 per cent) and large-caliber artillery systems (40 per cent).
- The exporters of major conventional weapons to Germany were the United States (60 per cent) and Italy (40 per cent).
- Germany reported the import of 16,329 SALW items, covering eight sub-categories. Of these, the majority were recoilless rifles (50.8 per cent), assault rifles (47.1 per cent) and portable anti-tank missile launchers and rocket systems (0.7 per cent).
- The main exporters of SALW to Germany were the United Kingdom (46.6 per cent), Singapore (18.4 per cent) and Switzerland (14.1 per cent).
