### REPORTING PRACTICE SUMMARY - 2022

Hungary's reporting changed slightly in 2022.

Hungary continued to report **Actual Numbers** of major conventional weapons and SALW exports.

Hungary reported **Actual Numbers** of major conventional weapon imports. It continued to report **Actual Numbers** of small arms imports and reported **Actual Numbers** of light weapons, a change from 2021 when it did not specify whether these imports were **Actual** or **Authorized**.

**GOOD PRACTICES**

Hungary provided clear, disaggregated data for each reported import and export.

Hungary provided descriptions and comments describing the nature and type of weapon for all reported exports and imports.

Hungary reported the state of origin of some of its reported exports and imports.

**ROOM FOR IMPROVEMENT**

Hungary excluded some data for 'commercial sensitivity/national security-related' reasons but did not specify where or how much information was withheld.

Hungary could indicate clearly that there were no reported exports or imports in specific weapons categories and sub-categories rather than leaving relevant sections of the reporting template blank.

**TRANSFER SUMMARY - 2022: EXPORT DATA**

- Hungary reported exports to 12 states in 2022. Of these, seven were States Parties, one was a Signatory and four were non-members (Egypt, Kyrgyzstan, Saudi Arabia and Uzbekistan).
- Hungary reported the export of 207 large-caliber artillery systems to Bulgaria.
- Hungary reported the export of 411 SALW items, covering four sub-categories. Of these, the majority were rifles and carbines (92.2 per cent), assault rifles (3.6 per cent) and revolvers and self-loading pistols (2.7 per cent).
- The main importers of SALW from Hungary were Germany (64.2 per cent), Kyrgyzstan (11.9 per cent) and United States (7.5 per cent).

**TRANSFER SUMMARY - 2022: IMPORT DATA**

- Hungary reported imports from seventeen countries in 2022. Of these, 15 were ATT States Parties and two were Signatories.
- Hungary reported the import of 254 major conventional weapons items, covering two categories. These were large-caliber artillery systems (86.6 per cent) and armoured combat vehicles (13.4 per cent).
- The exporters of major conventional weapons to Hungary were Bosnia and Herzegovina (81.5 per cent), Türkiye (12.6 per cent) and Germany (5.9 per cent).
- Hungary reported the import of 4,930 SALW items covering six sub-categories. Of these, the majority were rifles and carbines (72.8 per cent), revolvers and self-loading pistols (22.6 per cent) and light machine guns (3.6 per cent).
- The main exporters of SALW to Hungary were Germany (19.4 per cent), United States (18.3 per cent) and Italy (15.5 per cent).
