REPORTING PRACTICE SUMMARY - 2022

Poland's reporting changed slightly in 2022.

Poland continued to report **Actual Numbers** of major conventional weapons and SALW exports.

Poland did not report major conventional weapons imports. It continued to report **Actual Numbers** of SALW imports.

**GOOD PRACTICES**

Poland provided clear, disaggregated information on its reported exports and imports.

Poland provided descriptions of items for some exports of major conventional weapons.

**ROOM FOR IMPROVEMENT**

Poland excluded some data for 'commercial sensitivity/national security-related' reasons but did not specify where or how much information was withheld.

Poland could provide descriptions and comments describing the nature of its major conventional weapons exports and SALW exports and imports.

Poland could indicate clearly that there were no reported exports or imports in specific weapons categories and sub-categories rather than leaving relevant sections of the reporting template blank.

**TRANSFER SUMMARY - 2022: EXPORT DATA**

- Poland reported exports to 18 countries in 2022. Of these, 12 were ATT States Parties, three were Signatories and three were non-members (Brunei, Egypt and Oman).
- Poland reported the export of 39,797 major conventional weapons, covering seven categories. The majority of these were missile and missile launchers (missiles, etc.) (98.7 per cent) and large caliber artillery systems (0.9 per cent).
- In terms of numbers, the main importers of major conventional weapons from Poland were Ukraine (99.4 per cent), Bulgaria (0.5 per cent) and United States (0.1 per cent).
- Poland reported the export of 30,772 SALW items, covering nine sub-categories. Of these, the majority were rifles and carbines (20.2 per cent), revolvers and self-loading pistols (19.8 per cent) and sub-machine guns (18.8 per cent).
- The main importers of SALW from Poland were Ukraine (59.8 per cent), United States (13.8 per cent) and Netherlands (13.6 per cent).

**TRANSFER SUMMARY - 2022: IMPORT DATA**

- Poland reported imports from ten countries in 2022. Of these, six were ATT States Parties and four were Signatories.
- Poland did not report imports of major conventional weapons in its 2022 annual report.
- Poland reported the import of 2,553 SALW items covering seven sub-categories. Of these, the majority were revolvers and self-loading pistols (82.7 per cent), hand-held under-barrel and mounted grenade launchers (10.7 per cent) and assault rifles (4.3 per cent).
- The main exporters of SALW to Poland were the United States (54.3 per cent), Türkiye (19.9 per cent) and Republic of Korea (10.7 per cent).
