REPORTING PRACTICE SUMMARY - 2022

Portugal's reporting changed in 2022.

Portugal reported **Actual Numbers** and **Values** of major conventional weapons exports, whereas in 2021, it only reported numbers and values. It reported **Actual Numbers** and some **Values** for small arms exports, while only numbers were reported in 2021. It also reported **Actual Numbers** and **Values** for light weapons exports.

Portugal did not report imports of major conventional weapons. It reported **Actual Numbers** and some **Values** of small arms imports, in contrast to 2021 when it did not specify whether SALW imports were **Authorized** or **Actual**.

**GOOD PRACTICES**

Portugal provided clear, disaggregated data on all reported exports and imports.

Portugal provided descriptions and comments for its major conventional weapons exports.

Portugal reported values of major conventional weapons exports and some exports and imports of SALW.

**ROOM FOR IMPROVEMENT**

Portugal could provide more descriptions and comments describing the nature of its reported transfers.

Portugal could indicate clearly that there were no reported exports or imports in specific weapons categories and sub-categories rather than leaving relevant sections of the reporting template blank.

**TRANSFER SUMMARY - 2022: EXPORT DATA**

- Portugal reported exports to 33 countries in 2022. Of these, 25 were ATT States Parties, five were Signatories and two were non-members (Kuwait and Pakistan).¹
- Portugal reported the export of 23 major conventional weapons, covering two categories, with a total value of €1.4m (US\$1.5m).² In terms of value, the majority of these were armoured combat vehicles (73.5 per cent) and manned combat aircraft (26.5 per cent).
- In terms of value, the main importers of major conventional weapons from Portugal were Ukraine (73.5 per cent) and the United States (26.5 per cent).
- Portugal reported the export of 86,611 SALW items covering four sub-categories. In terms of numbers, the majority were rifles and carbines (98.5 per cent), assault rifles (1.2 per cent) and revolvers and self-loading pistols (0.4 per cent).
- In terms of numbers, the main importers of SALW from Portugal were the United Arab Emirates (45 per cent), Belgium (43.8 per cent) and Spain (2.1 per cent).

**TRANSFER SUMMARY - 2022: IMPORT DATA**

- Portugal reported imports from 25 countries in 2022. Of these, 23 were ATT States Parties and two were Signatories.
- Portugal did not report imports of major conventional weapons in its 2022 annual report.
- Portugal reported the import of 6,176 SALW items, covering three categories. Of these, the majority were rifles and carbines (83.5 per cent), and revolvers and self-loading pistols (16.4 per cent).
- The main exporters of SALW to Portugal were Belgium (27.8 per cent), Italy (19.4 per cent) and Germany (16.5 per cent).
