REPORTING PRACTICE SUMMARY - 2022

Serbia continued to report **Actual Numbers** of exports of major conventional weapons and SALW.

**GOOD PRACTICES**

Serbia provided clear, disaggregated data for each reported export and import.

Serbia provided descriptions and comments for some of its exports and imports.

Serbia reported the state of origin of some of its reported exports and imports.

**ROOM FOR IMPROVEMENT**

Serbia could provide descriptions and comments describing the nature of all its reported transfers.

Serbia did not provide descriptions of its reported exports under the small arms 'others' category.

Serbia could indicate clearly that there were no reported exports or imports in specific weapons categories and subcategories rather than leaving relevant sections of the reporting template blank.

**TRANSFER SUMMARY - 2022: EXPORT DATA**

- Serbia reported exports to 42 countries in 2022. Of these, 21 were ATT States Parties, eight were Signatories and 13 were non-members (Algeria, Azerbaijan, Egypt, Kenya, Kuwait, Kyrgyzstan, Lao People's Democratic Republic, Pakistan, Russian Federation, Saudi Arabia, Tajikistan, Uganda and Viet Nam).
- Serbia reported the export of 2,033 major conventional weapons, covering three categories. The majority of these were missile and missile launchers (missiles, etc.) (79.6 per cent) and large-caliber artillery systems (20.4 per cent).
- The main importers of major conventional weapons from Serbia were Bulgaria (39.4 per cent), Viet Nam (22.1 per cent) and United Arab Emirates (15.6 per cent).
- Serbia reported the export of 83,531 SALW items, covering nine sub-categories. Of these, the majority were rifles and carbines (65.4 per cent), revolvers and self-loading pistols (15.2 per cent) and portable anti-tank missile launchers and rocket systems (11.8 per cent).
- The main importers of SALW from Serbia were the United States (65.8 per cent), Bulgaria (7.6 per cent) and Burkina Faso (6.7 per cent).

**TRANSFER SUMMARY - 2022: IMPORT DATA**

- Serbia reported imports from 22 countries in 2022. Of these, 18 were ATT States Parties, three were Signatories and one was a non-member (Algeria).
- Serbia reported the import of 2,022 major conventional weapons items, covering four categories. The majority of these were missiles and missile launchers (missiles, etc.) (98.9 per cent), manned combat aircraft (0.8 per cent) and armoured combat vehicles (0.2 per cent).
- The main exporters of major conventional weapons to Serbia were Lebanon (98.9 per cent), Israel (0.7 per cent) and United States (0.2 per cent).
- Serbia reported the import of 3,933 SALW items, covering six sub-categories. Of these, the majority were revolvers and self-loading pistols (55.6 per cent), rifles and carbines (36.6 per cent) and 'others' (light weapons) (5.1 per cent).
- The main exporters of SALW to Serbia were Czech Republic (36.3 per cent), Italy (18.6 per cent) and Belgium (7.4 per cent).
